



Madame Lambert, of Canada, who was a Nun of the Order of Sacred Heart, died at the Hotel Chiquola at 12:45 p. m., Monday, 26th inst. This good lady had made the acquaintance of a number of our people, although she lived the retired life of her calling, and all who met her were much attracted by her graces of mind and person. These ladies whom she had met, Protestant and Catholic alike, ministered to her in her sickness, as did her devoted friend, Miss Gleeson, who came with her here. Her sister, Sister Georgetown, arrived from Washington, D. C., on Sunday night, coming around by way of Seneca. On Monday Rev. Father Gwynn administered to her the last solemn rites of the Church, and soon thereafter she died calmly and peacefully. The funeral services were held at St. Joseph's Catholic Church at 10:30 Tuesday morning, Father Gwynn saying the Mass for the dead. Mrs. R. S. Ligon sang so sweetly that exquisite hymn, "Lead, Kindly Light." Mrs. J. W. Quattlebaum sang "Not Ashamed of Jesus," in a very sweet manner. The Episcopal Church choir, by request, sang some of its hymns. After these services the body was laid to rest in Silver Brook Cemetery, and thus the gentle stranger became an inhabitant of our "City of the Dead."
